Schuylkill County boasts a variety of the very best in outdoor recreation including the Schuylkill River, three state parks, one county park, campgrounds, hiking, fishing, hunting, canoeing, golfing, biking, and much more. If you are intrigued by interesting history, lured by the beauty of the outdoors, or simply looking for a relaxing adventure just beyond the hustle

and bustle of the Poconos, Philadelphia, or PA Dutch Country, then Schuylkill County is the natural choice.



Schuylkill County is nestled between the moun tains of East-Central Pennsylvania in the Coal Country Corridor of the Schuylkill River National & State Heritage Area, where outdoor recreation, unique attractions, fascinating history, and a host of exciting events abound. It is a cultural heritage destination like no other.

Sweet Arrow Lake County Park, located Pine Grove and Washington Townships, is open to the public for fishing, hiking, boating, birding, enviromental education, and other programs. A reception hall and pavilion are available for rent.

Yuengling Brewery Museum and Gift Shop, home of America's oldest brewery, is right here in Pottsville, Pennsylvania. Unique tours of this National Historic Landmark, including the caves, are offered daily and on special weekends. Enjoy the free tour and even free samples at the end. Yuengling Museum and Gift shop is situated along historic Mahantongo Street, home of John O'Hara. Founded in 1829 by David G. Yuengling, they are a family owned company, now spanning over 180 years of continuous operation. Throughout five generations they have remained unique among breweries, distinguished by its culture, heritage, traditions, and portfolio of brands.

Hawk Mountain is a National Natural Landmark. The 200-degree panorama from atop Hawk Mountain's famed North Lookout is inarguably one of the most scenic views in the East. Visitors look down upon the endless stretch of forest along the

Kittatinny Ridge and out across a patchwork of farmland and fields that flank both sides of the scenic mountain

Experience America's Anthracite Heritage in one exciting adventure at Pioneer Tunnel Coal Mine in Ashland PA. Tour a real Anthracite Coal Mine, 1800 feet into the side of the mountain, and take a ride on an old-fashioned narrow gauge steam train. Museum, park, and gift shop nearby.

Next Stop, the Tamaqua Railroad Station! Take a step into the past as you enter Tamaqua's restored 1874 Philadelphia & Reading Railroad. Saved from the brink of demolition, the Tamaqua Railroad Station now serves as a heritage center as well as a cultural and economic hub in Historic Tamaqua.

The Schuylkill River begins in the mountains of Schuylkill County. We are best known for the vast quantities of hard anthracite coal that helped fuel America's Industrial Revolution during the 19th and 20th centuries. The mines attracted thousands of immigrant workers from around the world to Schuylkill County, creating a rich and diverse cultural community. Many of the foods, crafts, languages, and artistic traditions that these groups brought with them survive in Schuylkill County today. Start your journey on the trail where it all started-with us!

1. (H4) Locust Lake State Park - Located in scenic Ryan Township and accessible from Exit 131A (Rt. 54-Hometown) of I-81. Park features: camping, hiking, swimming, fishing, boating, bicycle riding, playground, and interpretive programs. (570) 467-2772

2. (I3) Tuscarora State Park - Located in Rush and Ryan townships, not far from Locust Lake and accessible from these I-81 exits: Exit 131A (Rt. 54-Hometown), and Exit 138 (Rt. 309-McAdoo). Park features: boating, camping cottages, fishing, swimming, and picnicking. (570) 467-2404

3. (C8) Swatara State Park - Located off Exit 100 of I-81 (Rt. 443-Pine Grove). The park is 3,515 acres, 6.5 miles long, and features fossil collecting, hiking, (including 2 miles of the Appalachian Trail), biking, horseback riding, fishing, hunting, canoeing, swimming, and picnicking. 4. (E7) Sweet Arrow Lake County Park - Located off Exit 100 (Rt. 443-Pine Grove) to Sweet Arrow Lake Road just east of Pine Grove. Annual Family Fun Fishing Event with yearlong tagged fish prizes with kick-off event in late April or early May. (570) 527-2505 www.sweetarrowlakepark.com

5. (G4) Whippoorwill Park - Park is owned by Frackville Borough and managed by South End Field & Stream. Located one mile east of Frackville on Morea Road.

6. (E7) Canal Park - Located along Carbon Street in the heart of Pine Grove

7. (D6) Hegins Community Park - Located on Park Lane off Rt. 25, Hegins.

8. (G3) Girard Park - Located on the north side of Shenandoah (Rt. 924) behind the Miner's Memorial.

9. (G2) Ringtown Recreation Facility - On Zion Grove Road, Union Township, just outside of Ringtown on Center Street off Main Street.

10. (E4) Higher-Up Park - Next to Pioneer Tunnel in Ashland. Follow signs from center of Ashland borough for coal mine.

11. (F5) 4th Street Recreation Facility - At the end of 4th Street off Sunbury Street (Rt. 901) in Minersville.

12. (G5) Charles Baber Cemetery - Found along West Market Street (Rt. 209) in Pottsville.

13. (G5) General George A. Joulwan Park -Off East Norwegian Street, Pottsville.

14. (G6) The Island - Found in the heart of Schuylkill Haven at the end of Broadway Street Bridge off Dock Street (Rt. 443).

15. (H6) Albright's Woods - Located along Grove Street just outside of Orwigsburg behind Blue Mountain Elementary East School.

16. (K5) West Penn Park - Found along Zion Stone Church Road just off Rt. 309.

17. (J3) Howard D. Buehler Memorial Park aka "The Bungalow" - Located near the Odd Fellows Cemetery on the west side of Tamagua off Rt. 209. Pool passes available, playground, concession stand, ample parking.

18. (I3) Hometown Wildlife Sanctuary - Located across Marian Ave. from Versum Materials. View ponds, wetlands, and scenic forested habitat.

19. (J3) Kellner Dam - Located in Tamaqua's northwest side near the elementary school. Features fishing and walking in a forested setting.

20. (J4) Rabbit Run Reservoir - Located southwest of Tamaqua off Valley Road. Fishing, hiking, and nature exploration.

21. (J3) Owl Creek Reservoir - Located just outside of Tamaqua, Owl Creek Reservoir is a multi-faceted park where people can fish (catch and release only), canoe/kayak, hike, ride their bikes, or just enjoy an afternoon walking with their dog(s). The commission holds several fun events during the year.

22. (C6) Valley View Park - Located along Gap Street in Valley View the park offers a playground and holds events throughout the year.

1. (I7) Appalachian Trail - Trail access located off Rt.645 and Rt. 501 south of Pine Grove, from Rt. 183, between Summit Station and Shartlesville (Berks County), off Rt. 61 at Port Clinton, from Hawk Mountain Road between Drehersville and Kempton (Berks County), and off Rt. 309 between Snyders and Schnecksville (Lehigh County). 2. (I7) Historic Tow Path Trail - Located along the Schuylkill River in Port Clinton. A two-mile riverbank trail that meanders through a number of Schuylkill Canal Locks. This trail passes through State Game Lands, therefore, access is limited during hunting season.

18. (E4) Schuylkill River Trail - 1.5 miles scenic segment along Rt. 61. Access is on Tumbling Run Road for parking. www.schuylkillrivertrail.com

19. (H6) Albright's Woods Walking Path - The path winds through the Little League fields and through the woods behind Blue Mountain Middle School. The walking path is paved and relatively flat and easy with benches along the way. At the park pavilion there is water, a playground, quoit pits, and picnic areas.

20. (G5) General George Joulwan East Side Park -Located on the site of the former East Side swimming pool on East Norwegian Street in Pottsville. The park contains a skate park, basketball courts, playground, and an amphitheater. The walking trail is about 1/3 of a mile in length, and the surface varies from stone to grass and asphalt.

21. (J4) Lehigh & New England Trail - A 3-mile, flat, crushed stone trail that follows a section of the former Lehigh and New England Railroad corridor. A lush tree canopy separates the trail from nearby Rt 309. Parking and signage regarding the general history of the trail is posted at the trailhead off Dairy Road. Benches are available at the trailhead entrance. About halfway through the trail are the remains of the Shellhamer Ice Dam, a former recreation and entertainment complex.

1. (I5) Little Schuylkill River - A portion of the Dam (SR 443), owned by DEP with parking available; New Ringgold with parking available at the SR 895 bridge. Recommend put-in at highway bridge in Hecla. Take out in Port Clinton just south of Rt. 61 bridge at confluence of Little Schuylkill and Schuylkill rivers. (484) 945-0200 www.schuylkillriver.org

2. (G6) The Island-Schuylkill River - Located in Schuylkill Haven at the end of Broadway St. Bridge off Dock St. (Rt. 443).

3. (H6) Rt. 895-Schuylkill River - Located on Rt. 895

1. (B6) Rausch Creek Trailriders - 8,500 acres of trails for year-round riding of dirt bikes, ATVs, and UTVs. Camping is available. www.rauschcreekracing.com

2. (G4) Famous Reading Outdoors - 20,000 acres of trail systems located in Schuylkill and Northumberland Counties for ATV, Dirt Bike, UTV, mountain bike, and hunting enthusiasts. www.readingoutdoors.com

1. (J4) Lehigh Valley & New England Rail Trail Located along Rt. 309, south of Tamaqua. Access trail from Dairy Road in West Penn Township.

2. (I4) Schuylkill Valley Heritage Trail - Located between Middleport and Tamaqua along Rt. 209.

1. (H7) Bear Creek - A portion of this creek is delayed harvest area and artificial lure only (DHALO). It is stocked with trout and located west of Auburn along Rt. 895.

2. (I5) Cold Run - A native trout tributary of the Little Schuylkill River, located one mile north of New Ringgold and flows through what is known

23. (F7) Stew Zerbe Handicap Fishing Access -Located next to the covered bridge on Newswanger Road in Washington Township. This access offers anyone the chance to enjoy fishing the trout stocked waters of the Lower Little Swatara Creek.

24. (J3) Owl Creek Reservoir – Located two miles southeast of Tamaqua, access to the reservoir is walk-in only with the exception of designated parking areas for persons with special needs. Smallmouth and largemouth bass, chain pickerel, and pumpkinseed sunfish. Boat launch, electric motors.

25. (F4) Little Mahanoy Creek - Stocked trout waters from Gordon toward Frackville.

3. (G7) Bear Creek Environmental Area Located within the Schuylkill County Fairgrounds, Rt. 895, Summit Station. Two miles of environmental interpretive trails through a variety of scenic wildlife habitats.

4. (F6) Frog Hollow Environmental Education Center - Located near Friedensburg, just off Rt. 443. Features trails, amphitheater, picnic pavilion, trout stream, and forested setting.

5. (H4) Locust Lake State Park - Located in Ryan Township and accessible from Exit 131A (Rt. 54-Hometown) of I-81. Features three hiking trails which are three-quarter, two, and four miles long. (570) 467-2772

6. (I3) Tuscarora State Park - Located in Rush and Ryan townships, not far from Locust Lake State Park and accessible from I-81 and Rt. 309 just north of Tamaqua. Features six hiking trails, five under 1-mile and one 14-mile trail. (570) 467-2404

7. (G5) Pottsville Bike/Hike Trail - Begins at the tennis courts and JFK Swimming Pool near John S. Clarke Elementary School off 16th Street. Trail is dog-friendly.

8. (D8) Swatara State Park - Located off Exit 100 of I-81 (Rt. 443-Pine Grove). The Park features a 2-mile hiking trail. (717) 865-6470

9. (G5) Pottsville Walking Tour - Self-guided walking tour throughout Pottsville. For more information contact the Schuylkill County Visitor's Bureau. (570) 622-7700 or 1-800-765-7282 www.schuylkill.org

10. (G6) Irish Flats Trail - Parallels the Schuylkill River in Schuylkill Haven. Located at the end of the Broadway Street Bridge off Dock Street (Rt. 443). Flat hike affording scenic views of the river. Part of the John Bartram Trail.

11. (H6) Landingville Marsh - A flat loop trail alongside the Schuylkill River that includes part of the John Bartram Trail and the foundation for the oldest transportation tunnel in America. Watch for birds including osprey. Located south of Landingville and its community park.

12. (I4) Schuylkill Valley Trail - Parallels Rt. 209 for eight miles from Tamagua to Middleport. Flat to gently rolling landscape that features scenic views of the surrounding mountains. An informational kiosk and picnic area can be found at the Newkirk Tunnel.

13. (F5) Minersville Walking Path - A short but scenic and paved path in the Fourth Street Recreation Complex.

14. (K5) West Penn Park Trail - The park is found off Rt. 309 on Zions Stone Church Road in West Penn Township. The short path crosses a small covered bridge into the forest and ends in a fun playground. A good family walk!

15. (D4) Conrad Weiser State Forest/Taylorsville Region - Hikers will enjoy a state forest road that ascends to a summit. Located just off Taylorsville/Bull roads. Stop by DCNR-Bureau of Forestry office in Aristes for a map. (570) 875-6450

16. (I7) John Bartram Trail - (aka Schuylkill River Trail) Access at Kernsville Dam, Hamburg.

22. (I4) Mary D Sports Complex & Walking Trail -This level, paved walking trail is ADA compliant and encircles the beautiful sports complex of a youth baseball field, soccer field, and ice skating pond. Walking "regulars" on the trail say three laps equal one mile. A large, paved lot affords ample parking.

23. (C6) Oldham Trail Bike & Walking Path - This 4-mile path through Hegins and Valley View was named in memory of Laura & Tom Oldham. The path surface is mostly paved asphalt with a few areas being gravel and grass. Restrooms and parking are located at the Hegins Park and Community Pool.

24. (E4) Senator James J. Rhoades Nature Trail This beautiful trail is paved with stone and allows visitors to walk and ride bicycles along a speciallydesigned path that extends about a half mile into the property. To access the trail, follow SR 901 to Lavelle and turn onto Dutchtown Road. Continue 1/2 mile and make a right onto Bolich Road. Proceed 1/4 mile to the trail on the right. There are no restrooms available and parking is limited.

25. (E7) Sweet Arrow Lake County Park - Located off Exit 100 (Rt. 443-Pine Grove) to Sweet Arrow Lake Road just east of Pine Grove. Four hiking trails and a boardwalk. HC accessible Waterfall Trail provides a view of the signature falls. (570) 527-2505 www.sweetarrowlakepark.com

1. (F6) Frog Hollow Environmental Education Center Located near Friedensburg, just off Rt. 443. Features: trails, picnic pavilion, trout stream, and amphitheater all in a scenic forested setting. Owned and maintained by the South Schuylkill Garden Club.

2. (G7) Dr. James S. Shadle Nature Center - Located in the Schuylkill County Fairgrounds, Summit Station. This center is part of the Bear Creek Environmental Area that features trails, wildlife blind, ponds, trout stream, wetlands board walk, forest, and fields. porcupinepat@yahoo.com

3. (I3) Tuscarora State Park - Located in Rush and Ryan townships, not far from Locust Lake State Park and accessible from I-81 and Rts. 54, 209 and 309. New visitor center has display room in addition to interpretive programs. (570) 467-2404

4. (J6) Hawk Mountain Sanctuary - Located 9 miles north of I-78, Exit 29B North to Rt. 895 East. (610) 756-6961 www.hawkmountain.org

5. (C6) Tri-Valley Environmental Education Center This center is directly behind Tri-Valley High School, Rt. 25, Hegins.

6. (G7) Red Creek Wildlife Center - Provides wildlife rehabilitation services for mammals, birds, and reptiles. The center has succeeded in releasing a good number of injured and orphaned animals. Informative

4. (F5) Schuylkill River Water Trail - Runs the 147-mile length of the Schuylkill River from its headwaters in Schuylkill County to its confluence with the Delaware River in Philadelphia. Access points at Terry Reiley Park with parking (Experienced paddlers only from here to Schuylkill Haven Island); Schuylkill Haven Island Park with parking available; Auburn Dam, parking at boat launch; Auburn SR 895 Trailhead, parking for 15 cars; Port Clinton Park, parking along Broad Street by railroad tracks. Several low-head dams and railroad bridges are in this reach. A water trail guide booklet is available from the Schuylkill River Greenway Association, 140 College Drive, Pottstown, PA 19464. 5. (D8) Swatara Creek Water Trail - A 6o-mile segment of Swatara Creek from Pine Grove, Schuylkill County, to the PA Fish & Boat Commission's Middletown Access in Middletown, Dauphin County. The Schuylkill County segment of the trail begins southwest of Pine Grove at a marked access point downstream of the Route 645 bridge. www.schuylkill.org/trails/swataracreek.pdf

6. (F5) Terry Reiley Park - Located on the Gordon Nagle Trail, near the intersection of West Market Street, (State Route 901, across from Sheetz). This eco-tourism initiative transformed a site, once known as a magnet for litter into a canoe ramp to encourage access to the West Branch of the Schuylkill River. Picnic facilities and parking are available.

3. (C7) Stony Valley Rail Trail - Intersects Gold Mine Road off Rt. 443 west of Suedberg and Pine Grove.

4. (G5) JFK Bicycle Trail - Located by the JFK Swimming Pool, Pottsville.

5. (C6) Hegins Bike Path - Located on Main Street, Hegins.

6. (D8) Swatara State Park - Located off I-81 (Exit 100-Rt. 443-Pine Grove). Features 9-miles of bike trails. (717) 865-6470

7. (H4) Locust Lake State Park - Located in Ryan Township. Accessible from I-81 Exit 131A, and Rt. 54, 61, and 209. Features one bike trail 1.3 miles long. (570) 467-2772


8. (I7) John Bartram Trail - (aka Schuylkill River Trail) Good bicycling trail from Hamburg to Auburn. www.schuylkillriver.org

EQUESTRIAN TRAIL HEAD

1. (G6) Weiser State Forest - Located in Dauphin, Schuylkill, Carbon, and Berks counties. The state forest is managed by the Department of Conservation and Natural Resources-Bureau of Forestry, Aristes. (570) 875-6450

2. (D8) Swatara State Park -Located off I-81 Exit 100 (Rt. 443-Pine Grove). Travel Rt. 443 West to see the state park near Suedberg. Riding is permitted on the road berm only. (717) 865-6470

3. (D5) Deep Creek - Stocked trout waters flow through the Hegins Valley. The creek starts at Route 901 and extends to the confluence with Pine Creek.

4. (G2) Little Catawissa Creek - Stocked and native trout waters near Ringtown. Parallels Rt. 339 to Bloomsburg.

5. (J3) Little Schuylkill River - Starting north of Tamaqua. Good trout fishing between Locust Creek and Panther Creek confluence, and Port Clinton above confluence with Schuylkill River. Delayed harvest area located near New Ringgold (DHALO).

6. (L4) Lizard Creek - Stocked trout waters along Rt. 895 east of Snyders.

7. (I3) Locust Creek - Stocked trout waters start at the outflow of Locust Lake and continue through Tuscarora State Park, and eventually enters the Little Schuylkill River.

8. (H₄) Locust Lake State Park - Nice lake fishing.

9. (F7) Lower Little Swatara Creek - Stocked trout waters start east of Rock and extend to the confluence with the Swatara Creek

10. (B5) Mahantongo Creek - Stocked trout waters located in the extreme northwest corner of Schuylkill County, and flow west from Rt. 125 to the northwest corner.

11. (K4) Mahoning Creek - Stocked trout waters located along Rt. 443 east of South Tamaqua and extending into Carbon County.

12. (I3) Pine Creek - Stocked trout waters located west of Hometown and flow alongside Rt. 54.

13. (I6) Pine Creek - Stocked trout waters located above Deer Lake.

14. (D6) **Pine Creek** - Stocked trout waters that flow just south of Rt. 25 starting east of Rt. 125 and continuing out of the county through the Hegins Valley.

15. (I3) Tuscarora State Park - Nice lake fishing.

16. (H6) Schuylkill River - Trout fishing from Middleport to Landingville, as well as West Branch-Schuylkill Haven to Pottsville. From south of Schuylkill Haven, experience either wild trout waters or warm-water fishing.

17. (D8) Swatara Creek - Good warm-water fishing starts below Pine Grove.

18. (E7) Sweet Arrow Lake County Park -Located along the Upper Little Swatara Creek for warm-water fishing with public boat access. Stocked trout waters.

19. (F6) Upper Little Swatara Creek - Starts near Friedensburg and flows west just north of Route 443. Trout waters end at Sweet Arrow Lake County Park.

20. (G3) Whippoorwill Park - Stocked trout waters located off Morea Road one mile east of Frackville near the Industrial Park.

21. (E7) Swatara Creek - Trout waters within Pine Grove, stocked by the Swatara Cooperative Trout Nursery. Native trout fishing below Tremont to warm-water fishing below Pine Grove.

The following state game lands (SGL) feature ample wildlife habitat.

1. (F8) SGL#80 - Rock-8,507 acres: deer, grouse, turkey, squirrel

2. (C4) SGL#84 - Helfenstein-8,790 acres: deer, grouse, squirrel

3. (I6) SGL#106 - Drehersville-9,374 acres: deer, grouse, squirrel, rabbit, turkey

4. (G8) SGL#110 - Summit Station-10,093 acres: deer, grouse, rabbit, turkey








Welcome to Schuylkill County!
